We usually have an amazing variety of budget-friendly, coated steel, and other [roofing and roofing supplies](#). Most of our [building supplies](#) auctions have roofing materials packed in a range of colours and sizes. At one recent auction we had packs starting from 2 and 3 sheets, right up to packs of over 170 sheets. And there were boxes of roofing screws as well. It is incredible the range of roofing and roofing supplies we often have listed!

How To Construct Your Fence

In very basic terms these are the steps you need to follow,

1. Mark out the area to be fenced with string and spray paint
2. Lay out the roofing and roofing supplies or carefully measure up how many sheets you'll need - allowing for struts
3. Dig post holes and fixing the struts and/or posts into them (usually with some sort of cement mix)
4. Fix the corrugated coated roofing sheets into the struts
5. Finish off and clean up

Of course, this is only a rough guide, but there is an extremely generous blog site called [Our Family Projects](#) that gives you a more precise overview on 'putting in' a fence assembled from coated corrugated steel. Because coated corrugated steel can be a bit tricky to handle, cut and shape, renovators tend to always use the whole sheet, and the specially designed struts they slot into. To add a bit of extra flair, some handypeople build wooden frames or alternate roof sheeting panels with wooden ones. However, if you are extremely competent and experienced in using coated corrugated steel, understand the problems you might encounter and how to solve them, then you can let your design creativity run-wild by creating a panel fence similar to this one on the right.

You need to be extra careful when shaping and handling coated steel; it can be quite difficult to cut and has sharp edges. Always follow strict safety rules and never attempt to cut, renovate or build with roofing and roofing supplies unless there is another adult close by to assist if an accident occurs. [Blue Scope Steel](#) has a recommended list of things you need to know to handle coated corrugated steel appropriately.

As we always say....

If in doubt, call in the professionals! Generally, erecting a coated corrugated steel fence isn't brain surgery, but you do need to be a pretty highly skilled home handyperson to create a fence from roofing materials*.

And it can be a good idea to use our roofing and roofing supplies for a smaller job first, just to get an idea on how to successfully use and handle coated corrugated steel.
